#### **<u>1. Call the meeting to order</u>**

Meeting was called to order at 5:00 pm by Chairperson Holly McManus

## 2. Approval of Minutes

Michael Lambrecht moved to approve the minutes of the November 14, 2022 Parks & Recreation Advisory Committee Meeting. Seconded by Carl Garnetzke. Josh Sopzcak and Lee Wishau abstained. Motion carried unanimously.

#### 3. Public comment

Tom Devornay, 5329 Sunshine Lane, stated that he is still opposed to the Crawford Park entrance on Sunshine Lane and that the Committee should also know that he wants he would like an open space with trees in place of the proposed soccer field as shown on the plan. He added that he spoke with neighbors in the area and will be submitted a list of signatures in opposition.

Pat Rader, asked if the dog park has been relocated on the site and the Committee stated it was up for discussion on the agenda.

Bob Roeder, 8510 7 Mile Road, stated he is opposed to the proposed dog park at Gorney Park. He stated that Whitnall Park closed their dog park due to problems and that if built here, the Village will have similar problems.

## 4. Gorney Park Dog Park

Trustee Wishau presented the new northern dog park design and what constraints and benefits associated with the new location. The committee discussed the proposed location and requested that updated cost estimates be presented to the Committee for review to install the dog park on the north portion of the park along 7 Mile Road. The 2023 CIP budget allots a total of \$30,000 in park impact fees. If costs exceed this amount, the Village Board will need to approve any budget increase for the project. Carl Garnetzke stated that he is in opposition to the proposed dog park because we have existing dog parks in the near area that residents can use.

## 5. Maple Park Project

Ryan Schmidt presented an overview of the development project which includes concrete sidewalks and open-air shelter. The shelter will be located north of the existing playground and have sidewalks extend to the east and west connecting to the existing neighborhood sidewalks abutting the park. The costs will likely exceed the budgeted amount and will require a request for additional funds. The committee discussed options to value engineer the project to reduce costs. Staff will provide final numbers at a future meeting.

#### 6. Nicholson Wildlife Refuge

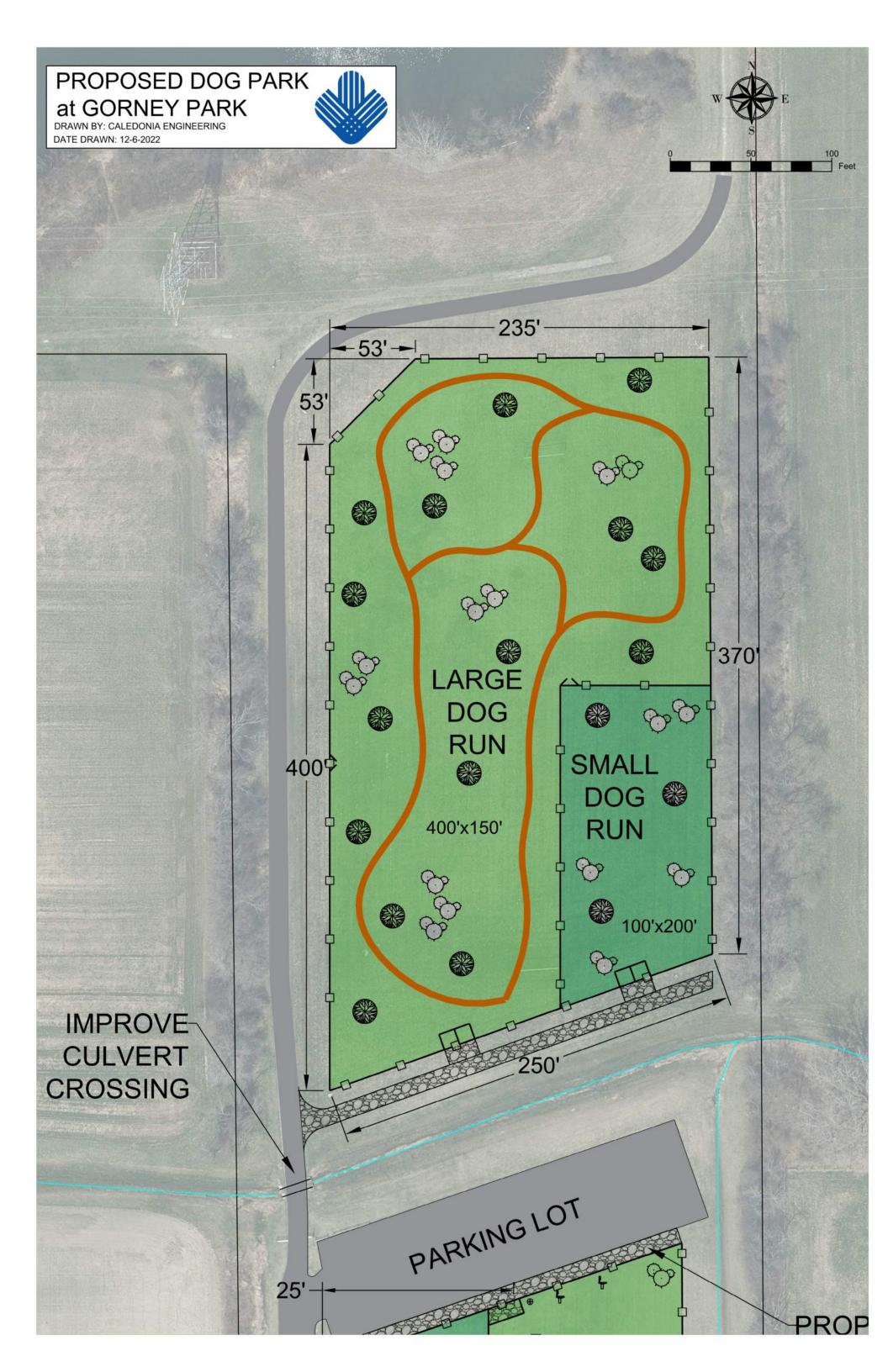
Staff provided information regarding the water drainage issues facing the park discussing existing drainage tiles and the impacts of the reconstruction of 5 Mile Road. The DNR required that the drainage tile not drain to the north to preserve the wetlands within the refuge. There is a suspected broken drainage tile causing water to stay on the site. To repair this broken tile, the Village will need to experience several dry seasons to access the drainage tile.

## 7. Crawford Park Master Grading and Erosion Control Plan

Ryan presented the RFP responses with the Committee. The Village received three responses. Staff evaluated the responses and recommended Clark Deitz as the consultant to do the work as they were the most affordable and meet the scope of the project. The plan should be completed in March 2023. This plan will guide the Village when phasing the development of Crawford Park.

Re:	Maple Park Sidewalk and Open-Air Shelter Cost Analysis

## **Background Information**

As part of the 2022 budget, \$40,000 dollars was set aside as part of the CIP plan for the extension of sidewalk and installation of an open-air shelter at Maple Park. These funds come directly from Park Impact Fees and were to be utilized in 2022. A recommendation was made to go out for proposals to purchase and install the structure as well as install sidewalk in the park in October 2022. The 20' x 28' shelter has since been purchased in 2022 for \$21,108. The shelter is built using concrete bases, tubular steel columns, laminated wood beams, 2x8 tongue and groove decking, and a metal roof. During that time, staff has worked with contractors to get pricing on the shelter installation (labor) and the proposed concrete sidewalk.

The final cost proposals for the shelter installation are as follows:

- J.W. and Sons LLC: \$9,100.00
- Deck It Out Builders: \$15,200.00
- Carbide Carpentry: \$15,650.00

The final costs for the concrete installation were broken down into two alternatives; to install concrete from both sides of the park to the shelter and to only install concrete under the shelter and on the east side of the park. The breakdown is as follows:

- Pete's Crete LLC: Whole Project: \$23,076.00 East Side and Slab: \$12,015.00
- G.I. Concrete: Whole Project: \$26,281.00 East Side and Slab: \$13,683.75
- Wandel Contractors: Whole Project: \$40,870.16 East Side and Slab: \$24,884.40

Based on the above costs and the current Park Impact Fees dedicated for the project, the Village cannot install the shelter and the sidewalk on the eastern portion of the site within the \$40,000 budget. Based on the two lowest contractors, we have the following numbers to work with:

- Purchase Shelter, Install Shelter, and Construct Full Length Sidewalk.
  - o **\$53,284.00**
- Purchase Shelter, Install Shelter, and Construct East Sidewalk Only.
  - o **\$42,223.00**


To complete the vision of the park and install the sidewalk in any capacity, the Parks Advisory Committee will need to recommend to the Finance Committee and the Village Board to authorize the use of additional Park Impact Fees. The committee will need to decide whether or not to provide an additional \$5,000 for completing the smaller portion of the project, or \$15,000 for the full site completion. A contingency has been added in the numbers requested. The total cost for concrete does not exceed the threshold for public bidding and allows the Village the perform the work within the Village's procurement policy.

If the Park Advisory Committee is in favor of extending the sidewalk in both directions and completing the entire project, a motion is needed as recommended below. If the Parks Committee believes that the east walk is satisfactory and serves the need of the community, a motion will still be needed to request additional funds, but for only the \$5,000 total.

#### **Staff Recommendation**

PARKS - Move to recommend to the Finance Committee and Village Board to authorize the expenditure of an additional \$15,000 in Park Impact Fees at Maple Park for the installation of concrete pedestrian path connecting both the east and west sides of the park to the new shelter.

FINANCE – Move to authorize the expenditure of an additional \$15,000 in Park Impact Fees at Maple Park for the installation of a concrete pedestrian path connecting both the east and west sides of the park to the new shelter.



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
